## Report to AIS Board of Directors Meeting April 2019 IMAGE COORDINATOR Neil Houghton

Responding to the policy requiring images for New Registrations:

A master registration Google Drive Folder was set up online.

Within that folder, a subfolder for each registrant was set up and a link sent to allow registrants to either:

upload directly or

email as attachment to me and I will upload

Instructions on use and expected file names, size and formats are:

On the website (I hope) and

Sent to individuals when I am copied John's emails confirming their

registrations.

Stats – based on a spreadsheet shared by John Jones / compared to images in Googl Drive folders.

Set A: includes only Registered in 2018 1086 registrations received Image Coordinator: 353 images uploaded by registrant or me. 32.5% 152 individual registrants 61 registrants have submitted images 40.13% Set B: Includes Registered and Introduced in 2018 1086 registrations received Image Coordinator: 471 images uploaded by registrant or me. 43.7% 152 individual registrants 64 registrants have submitted images 42.11%

## Skewing factors:

<u>Registration year confusion</u>. While I have struggled to understand this, I chalked it up to inexperience. I had the facts, but there was a logical block. Could an iris Introduced in early 2017 still not be in the "R and I" until the fall of 2018? One major registrant made me FINALLY understand that, by using reserved names, catalogs are published before the registrations are even submitted, let alone images. Others have tried to get this through my think head. Maybe it is relatively unimportant, but when trying to verify my progress for statistics like this (balance the books as it were) it was important. As I prepare for 2019 registrations, I would like to clarify which year is in the file name, knowing that most retailers refer to the year of introduction as opposed to Registration.

<u>International influence</u>: John Jones supplied me with a list of various international registrar assistants. I contacted them directly. The response form some of these areas has been either much higher or very low to nonexistent. I must say that those who did respond to me have been extremely cooperative and supportive. If desired I would break these down, but I can say without hesitation that based on percentage of submission of images, the USA(and Canada) are far behind.

## PROGRESS:

<u>Satisfaction</u>: Given that change is never easy, I am feeling encouraged and the process is ongoing.

<u>Going Forward</u>: I have been in discussion with John Jones throughout the process. He has been very helpful. This year of shifting Electronic Services Coordinator responsibilities has been difficult for many of us, but we have at least managed to **think** about looking forward. The most encouraging discussions have been around data base manipulations. Much of what I have been forced to do to keep track of images in, contacting people to remind them about the requirement, etc. has been a duplication of efforts. Much of the information I use to create tracking in spreadsheets is available in the Filemaker Pro database that John uses. We have discussed the possibility of remote access and the ability to protect what data can be accessed and not accidently changed.

<u>Online Registration</u>: For my part, this is inevitable and needed. That has been supported by the cooperation with the online upload of images and the outright request of several hybridizer to make this available.

<u>Database accessibility</u> and the ability to register online can go hand-in-hand. Images stored online can become a link stored in a record of the cultivar. The email of the registrant/hybridizer can be easily accessible if I need to make contact. The actions that I take can be recorded for someone else to see and the date automatically stamped.

<u>Encyclopedia</u>: I am trying to optimize for the Wiki/Encyclopedia staff to images. This, I believe, could be accomplished more efficiently. I will work with Terry Laurin.

#### **Other Responsibilities:**

I sssist in gathering images for publications and creating and encouraging "Photo Tips."

#### Still on the back burner:

This year has more than full of things to accomplish. One thing that I haven't done but still want to establish that group of exemplary photographers. I have discovered many of them and offered them a place on the Google Drive to archive what they consider to be there best work. All I can say is, it's only a start... but it is a start.

#### **OBSERVATIONS:**

It has become apparent to me that we are blessed with many wonderfully skilled and dedicated people that make the AIS work! I can't thank those who have assisted me to become more knowledgeable and hopefully to contribute to our progress.

There are some observations I would like to share:

**Deep Bench**: While some of our work is the result of well functioning teams, other rests on the shoulders of a single person. This includes me. Immortality is not one of my attributes so I worry about who would pick up the pieces if... We as an organization rely on volunteers and training our successors should be a priority. We need a deeper bench.

**Task and Data Integration**: We have started a move in this direction, recognizing that our new website must be accessible for many people to be able to update. The more that we understand and share the tasks, the more we become interdependent, the better prepared we are for any eventuality. This will also help with maintaining that deep bench.

**Cooperative Workflow**: However the data is eventually organized, and how it eventually can be accessed, come workflow issues must be addressed. We have created isolated cubicles of ownership. We need to develop ways of working together.

Addressing these issues is, IMHO, crucial.

- **Comments:** We welcome any feed-back, be it positive, editorial comments, or ways in which the program might be improved. Please direct comments to <u>images@irises.org</u>.
- **Contribute Programs**: Our hope is to continually grow the library of programs available. Many of these are developed in coordination with local affiliates, growers and hybridizers. #### Some PowerPoint Tips:

Microsoft's presentation program, PowerPoint<sup>™</sup>, is currently the industry standard. This program will need to be installed on the computer that you connect to a display (projector or large screen display) to share with others.

The suffix on a PowerPoint file name may .ppt or .pptx. The 'x' indicates a it was created in a newer version. Always try run the presentation before you present. If you run into issues you can let the Program Coordinator know. We can make every effort to be sure it runs on your equipment. It will also mitigate the chance that something goes wrong at the event.

Programs may be set to advance automatically or to move from slide to slide by pressing a key. This is usually the space bar or a forward arrow. The back arrow will present the previous slide. Cetain programs may include an animated effect. These are set for automatic or manual advance. There will be information about this is the 'notes' area.

We recommend using the Presenter View. While the means to access this varies between PC and Macintosh, you will find a drop down or pop-up menu to select it. This view shows just the slide on the projected image or display, but the computer screen gives the presenter much more information including:

Elapsed time and clock time A progress bar (red 'thermometer' display position in the presentation) The current slide image

The next slide image

The 'Notes' field (suggested talking point, a script and/or instruction WHEN PRESENT) A line of images with the previous, current and upcoming slides.
